

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

Well done for coming to ask me for help. Sometimes the internet can be confusing and it is always a good idea to ask for help from an adult that you trust.



Edited or 'photoshopped' photographs and videos can be just as misleading as fake news stories and websites which contain misinformation.

In fact, there is a saying that "a picture paints a thousand words". A misleading photo can spread misinformation more quickly and more easily than a long news article.



Why would someone change or edit a photo and then share it?

There could be many different MOTIVATIONS for creating faked photographs. Let's explore them together...



There can be lots of reasons but they are mainly...



...to get as many 'clicks' on their website as possible. This helps them to make money from advertising.

...to make someone think a certain way and to influence their actions.



...because they think it is funny.



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


